The President's Award was presented to Frank Kinnison for his continued work as Secretary and special assistant to the President.


The Bill Donnell Distinguished Service Award was presented by Jim Corson to Gib Hertler for his outstanding

WAY BACK WHEN

The First Chorus Contests

By 1952, a new facet in Barbershop competition was gaining steam--chorus contests. In the summer of 1952, both the Land O' Lakes District and the Johnny Appleseed District held chorus contests with more than 1,000 barbershoppers and members of their families attending each. These were not the first chorus contests in those districts but they were indications of the growing enthusiasm. Others of the 14 districts had chorus contests scheduled for the late summer and early fall months. The first Michigan District chorus contest was held in July of 1952 with nine choruses competing and roughly 2,100 barbershoppers and their families attending.

The first international chorus contest was held in Detroit at the 1953 convention. The winners, the Great Lakes Chorus of Grand Rapids, Michigan, were acclaimed the "1953 International Convention Championship Chorus." Fifteen other choruses competed, and the affair was considered a big success. It was an experiment to test the popularity of the chorus contest idea, but not all districts were represented, so it was not until 1954 in Washington, D.C., that the winning chorus, the Singing Capital Chorus of the host chapter, could be crowned the "SPEBSQSA International Chorus Champions." Some 889 men in 23 choruses wre involved in that contest, which from then on became an official part of the annual convention program.

Answers to this month's history quiz:

- 1- Barbershops, first in England, then here, were places of extemporaneous, amateur music making since Elizabethan times. A song written in 1910 and entitled [Mister Jefferson Lord] "Play That Barbershop Chord" iced the cake.
- 2- Minstrel shows in the late 19th and early 20th centuries and, thereafter, vaudeville.
- 3- Radio, more so than any other factor. For the first time in human history, radio brought affordable and widely available entertainment into almost every home. This led to the rapid demise of vaudeville shows, barbershop's most important venue during the first third of the twentieth century.
- 4- They began their show biz careers as professional barbershop quartet singers.
- 5- The influence was immense, but this is a give-a-way to all of you scholars who read the lengthy article on the history of barbershop harmony in the August 2001 issue of the *Harmonizer*.



Barbershop Harmony Society society to seek HQ site in **Nashville**

January 20, 2006 - Sacramento, CA

The Society Board at its 2006 Midwinter Convention in Sacramento, CA has adopted a motion instructing the Headquarters Relocation Committee to find an appropriate site for Society Headquarters in the Nashville, Tennessee area.

"The Board feels that Nashville will prove the greatest location in which we can achieve our vision of the Society's future," said Society President Drayton Justus. "Nashville's international reputation as 'Music City USA' connects our musical art form with many other resources to advance our mission and vision."

Strong possibilities for tourism, an excellent business and employment climate, and a transportation-friendly central location were also cited as reasons for the choice.

The action comes after four years of national search by a Harmony Hall Task Force and its successor Headquarters Relocation Committee, both charged with evaluating and identifying locations for the Society Board to consider. Nashville, Dallas-Fort Worth, and the Milwaukee-Chicago corridor had been considered finalist locations from an initial list of more than fifteen cities.

Although several Nashville-area facilities have been reviewed, no specific site has been selected. "The Board's action Friday directs the committee to bring back a list of options, and a business plan for relocation, including the actual site in Nashville, the headquarters total operational needs, and the staffing to support it," said Justus.

An initial timeframe for moving in Spring 2007 is contemplated, although this will depend in part on the progress of a new IT infrastructure installation, and the timeliness of the recommendations and negotiations in securing the best site within the Nashville market.

"Our dedicated Harmony Hall staff has been extremely patient through this entire search," said Executive Director Ed Watson. "Some families may choose to not relocate, yet their professionalism continues to drive them to serve our members every day. The Board applauds the dedication and patience shown by our staff during this unsettling period of uncertainty."

The meeting was called to order at 9:01 AM with the singing of "Down Our Way".

proved as received. Frank Kinnison reported that the 2006 Society dues are \$87.00 and the 2007 dues will be \$97.00.

Jim Corson, President, appointed the nominating committee for 2006. They are Gib Hertler (Chair), Jim Minoudis and Randy Finger.

Keith Slater, Music and Performance VP, reported on the plans for 2006. The "Jazz Medley" may be dropped in light of our absence from the Jazz Jubilee this year. Instead two songs will be introduced, "Way Down Yonder In New Orleans" and "Mardi Gras March/ South Rampart Street Parade Medley". The Music Team viewed a VHS tape of "How to Build a Better Chorus" with Bill Biffle and Dr. Greg Lyne. The Team thought it was very well done and will be used at our Chapter meetings and reinforced at the Retreat.

Jim Newlove, Chapter Development and Membership VP, reported that the Chapter Development Team is working with Public Relations and Marketing VPs on a schedule of three Guest Nights and three AFA's or mini AFA's for next year as well as other marketing ideas in promoting our chapter's membership. We are also looking for ideas on ways to bring back non-regular members, increase the number of guests who are potential members and on programs that will improve the chances that these guests will want to join our chapter.

Gib Hertler received a letter from Iris Renfree, Guide Supervisor, with the Department of Parks and Recreation at the Capitol thanking the Capitolaires for our participation in the Annual Holiday Music Program. She wrote, "Thank you for your musical gifts to the visitors as well as the staff. We have all been enriched by your efforts." She went on to say "P.S. We'll try to book the Governor next year for you."
